The Sociedad Española de Neurociencia (SENC) announces the celebration of the 10th Cajal Conference. The aim of this series of Conferences is to bring together specialists in a Neuroscience area to present their recent data and discuss with international leaders in the field on common interests in an open, informal atmosphere.

The conference will address the framework of translation of basic neuroscience breakthroughs, into new diagnostic and therapeutic tools and improvements in the quality of life. The issues faced by the translation of advances in knowledge in the neurosciences to "bedside", including expectations, timelines and pathways to acceleration of the applications will be raised and discussed. The aim is to actively expose young researchers to the successes and problems faced by translational approaches in neuroscience, so that their own research gains a new perspective in relation to human health.

Venue and accommodation



The venue of the Conference, "Casa de la Demandadera", is part of the old Carmelite Convent complex located in a beautiful building baroque from the XVI-XVII centuries within the city historic district. The meeting hall and adjacent facilities provide a great setting for scientific discussion and interaction, with the background breathtaking views overlooking the gorge of the Huescar river.

Background about Cuenca: Cuenca is an ancient city located in the foothills of the Iberian Mountain Range, 165 km southeast of Madrid, perched between the deep gorges of two merging rivers: Júcar and Huescar. Deeply rooted in Spain´s and Europe history since the first recorded settlements in the Superior Paleolithic,



the city preserves a first order cultural, historic and architectonic heritage, with a very special medieval and renaissance atmosphere. Since 1996 its historic district is listed by UNESCO as World

Heritage of the humankind. Culturally a booming city, Cuenca houses several first-class museums, including the National Museum of Abstract Art. There are plenty of leisure and recreational alternatives, ranging from top restaurants to taste distinctive regional and international cuisine, secluded pubs in medieval houses to share breathtaking views with friends while having a drink or nature and outdoor activities in the mountains and gorges surrounding the city. Cuenca is a city of great personality which offers the perfect combination of and active and at the same time soothing setting for the aims of the Cajal Conference.
